Marriage, registered	Chad	No family code; marriage is governed by customary law but can be notarized.	No
Forthcoming changes	The government continues to work on the 1999 <i>Code des personnes et de la famille</i> , which is intended to replace the Civil Code. It is unclear whether the new family code will recognize same-sex marriages.
